DAILY FAMILY READINGS





INTRODUCTION

Lent is a season that happens in preparation for Easter and lasts for 40 days. During Lent, people often do things to help them grow closer to God and think about the important things in life. It lasts for 40 days as a reflection of Christ's fasting during His temptations and testing in the wilderness.

The Christian faith is made up of a series of Spiritual Disciplines. As we walk through these 40 days together, we will take a look at 4 of them and prayerfully begin incorporating them into our daily, weekly, and monthly rhythms of life. You may choose to begin these rhythms as a family, but eventually, they should become individual rhythms as each member finds their own journey with Jesus.

Lent is a special time to be a little more thoughtful, to give up something as a way of remembering what's important, and to do extra nice things for others. It helps people get ready for the joyful celebration of Easter!

We at The Church of the Cross are excited to take this journey with you.

Each week will have a different focus and daily readings through the Book of Common Prayer for families. You can choose to take Sundays off or use Sundays as a preparation day for the rest of the week. There is no right or wrong way. Choose what fits the rhythm of your family best. The goal: perseverance and completion.

So, if you're ready to go, turn the page, and let's get started!

Fasting

Week 1

Because Christ gave up food and drink for 40 days, one common thing people do during Lent is to give up something they really like, like chocolate or video games. It's not because these things are bad, but it's a way of reminding ourselves to focus on what's really important and to appreciate what we have. You may choose something individually or as a family. (Idea: No technology Sundays) It is a Spiritual Discipline that allows you to focus more on your relationship with God and less on some of the things that might distract you.

Weekly Challenge

As your family prepares for the 40 days, choose what to give up, either as a family, as individuals, or both.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the starting point for Lent. On this day, people go to a service, and the priest puts a small cross of ashes on their foreheads. These ashes are a reminder that Lent has started and Easter is on the way. The ashes usually come from burning the palms used in the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. It's a way of reusing those palm branches to symbolize deeper meanings.

People get marked with ashes to kick off a time of thinking about important things, being kind, and getting ready for Easter. It's a simple way of saying, "Hey, something special is happening, and we're on a journey together!"

Ash Wednesday services are at Cross Schools for our school family. You can also check The Church of the Cross website for more times and locations.

Forty days of readings, Scripture, and prayer begins today. (Liturgy provided by Family Prayer from the Daily Office. www.dailyoffice2019.com)

Readings

The following order is for every morning and/or evening for 40 days. The only thing that changes day to day is the Scripture reading, which is listed after the readings.

(The Reading and the Collect may be read by one person, and the other parts said in unison or in some other convenient manner. Choose a time that best suits your family's schedule and commit to that time for 40 days.)

Almsgiving

Week 2

Almsgiving is like spreading kindness and helping others. It's a bit like sharing your toys or giving a friend a helping hand when they need it. But almsgiving is a special way of doing that with people you might not know; who might need a little extra support.

Imagine if you have some extra snacks, and you share them with a friend who doesn't have any. That's a bit like almsgiving! It's about sharing what you have, whether it's time, money, or things, to make someone else's day a bit brighter.

It's not about how much you give but about the care and love you put into making someone else smile. Unlike fasting, which is within ourselves, almsgiving is in regard to our neighbor. Whether it's helping a neighbor, giving to a charity, or doing something nice for someone, almsgiving is all about making the world a better place, one kind act at a time!

Weekly Challenge

This week, decide as a family how you can give to others. Maybe set out an almsgiving jar and collect extra change throughout the next few weeks, or volunteer at the food bank together. Get creative and do the thing that will affect your family most and will help make a difference in the community.

Bible Reading

Week 3

We've been enjoying our daily Bible verse during our Morning Readings, haven't we? But perhaps we can enrich our spiritual journey even further. It's not just about reading a verse each day; it's about letting the Word sink deep into our hearts and minds.

You may have noticed that the same Scriptures come up repeatedly throughout the weeks. That's intentional. It's so that these words become more than just words; they become a part of who we are.

Weekly Challenge

So, this week, let's take a step beyond just reading. Let's read the Scripture and then take time to discuss what it means to each of us. Let's pick out keywords and explore how they fit into the larger context of what we're reading. And if a verse or passage leaves us wanting more, let's grab our Bibles and dive into the whole chapter surrounding it.

As we engage with the text, let's ask ourselves questions like: Who is the main character? What are they trying to communicate? Is there a conflict, and if so, how is it resolved? And perhaps most importantly, how does all of this relate to our lives?

Remember, Bible reading and meditation are like any other discipline; they take time to develop. Let's be patient and forgiving with ourselves as we grow in this practice together. The important thing is to keep pressing on, knowing that each moment spent in God's Word brings us closer to Him and to each other as a family.

Prayer

Week 4

Prayer is like having a conversation with our best friend. We can pray quietly by ourselves or join our voices with others in our family or church. We can speak from our hearts or use words that have been written down for us.

Have you ever heard of the Psalms? They're like a big book of prayers that we can read and learn from. And Jesus taught us a really important prayer called The Lord's Prayer. It's like a template for how we can talk to God.

In the Anglican tradition, there's this special book called the Book of Common Prayer. It's a treasure chest full of prayers for every day of the year. From that book, there's something called the Daily Office, which is a fancy way of saying a daily prayer routine. It's been around for a really long time, and it helps people like us connect with God throughout the day.

Now, here's something cool: There are different times of the day when we can pray. Morning, when we wake up; midday, when the sun is high in the sky; early evening, as the day winds down; and close of day, before we go to sleep. And you know what? Each of these times has its own special prayers and readings. It's like a menu where we can pick what we want to talk to God about, depending on the time of day.

Weekly Challenge

Go to <u>www.dailyoffice2019.com</u> and click on the link "Switch to Family Prayer". Look through the different daily options and become familiar with them. Add one of the other rhythms to your week. Maybe close of day as you're putting everyone to bed.
