

"Fighting Faithfully to the Finish" – June 2024 Thoughts to Ponder

When Paul wrote these words, he was in a prison in Rome knowing that he would soon be executed: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." (II Timothy 4:7)

- 1. Paul summarized his life with the words: fought, finished, faithful.
  - a. When you look back on your life, what words or brief sentences would best capture the essence of your time on earth?
  - b. Will those who write your epitaph give the same summary? If not, how will their perceptions differ?
- 2. Few would quibble with the image of life as a battle because it never stops being a struggle.
  - a. Please recount some of your early and ongoing struggles.
  - b. When and how did you learn that life does not owe you a living?

- 3. Paul survived his many struggles because "the Lord stood at my side and gave me strength." (II Timothy 4:17)
  - a. Recount some of the situations in which people you were counting on let you down. Why did they fail to meet your expectations?
  - b. Please explain how you came to believe that "only the Lord is finally and fully faithful." If you don't believe this, who have you found to be more trustworthy?
- 4. In that Roman cell, Paul saw life as a race that he had successfully finished.
  - a. When do you think the race began for Paul? What did the finish line look like for him? What guidelines governed Paul's life?
  - b. How do you define a successful life?
- 5. With the words "in heaven a crown is waiting for me" (II Timothy 4:8) Paul was saying that he did not see death as an end, but as a freeing departure from this world's constraints. Do you see death as something to be feared or to be confidently awaiting? Please explain your answer.
