 - a. Describe some of the ways you benefited from adversity as you matured.
 - b. Speculate on how you might be different today had you never been a child.
- 2. Despite having their every need completely met in the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve became obsessed with obtaining more.
 - a. How do you differentiate between your needs and wants?
 - b. Many folks are consumed with the desire to have more than they need; are you one of them? Explain why or why not.
- 3. Material wealth is a blessing it's a gift from our generous God and our first responsibility is to thank God for all we have received.
 - a. The farmer in Jesus' story is patting himself on the back for his harvest while totally ignoring the sunlight and rain God alone provided. Describe a time you were guilty of ignoring God's contributions to your success (remember God gave you your health, your brain and your talents).

- b. The Bible teaches that we are to thank God with a tithe of all He has given us. Are you being obedient? Explain why or why not.
- 4. Jesus said: "A man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." (Luke 12:15 NIV) In other words: our possessions do not give our lives meaning.
 - a. How have you allowed your possessions to define you?
 - b. When folks converse after your funeral, will they be talking about your tangible accomplishments or the intangible essence of who you were?
