## 2020 in Review from Pastor Kevin

Just 2 months into my role as Chaplain at Cross Schools, COVID-19 began shutting things down. Still, the Lord has continued to work and move and do marvelous things at Cross and at the church.

During the Spring season of remote learning and virtual programs, I focused on developing the vision and focus of the Christian Formation programs at Cross Schools. The addition of a high school has required some significant changes to the way we approach formation and education. Across all programs – academic, athletic, and faith – Cross Schools leadership has taken a top-down approach, considering where we want a successful senior to be upon graduation. From that perspective, we’ve worked our way backward in vertically aligning programs and curriculum to meet those goals.

One of my major tasks this year has been to develop the Christian Formation programs of the new Cross High School. I’ve had the enormous privilege of teaching and connecting with the 24 students of the inaugural freshman class and developing a particularly special bond with them. I hope to be for them as Pastor Jonathan has been to the graduating seniors of the class of 2020. In anticipation of the high school’s growth, I have been preparing class curriculum and materials for the upcoming New Testament and Christian Leadership classes, as well as prayerfully dreaming and vision-casting formational extracurricular activities and programs in partnership with Tim.



But I’m not only a pastor to the high schoolers, but to the whole community. It’s been a joy to teach and connect with the 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade students as well and get to know them and their families. I continue to focus on building relationships with Cross families and faculty and being a pastoral resource for them. Thank you for supporting the ministry of Cross Schools with your prayers and gifts! The Lord is doing marvelous things in our midst. To God be the glory, great things He has done!

## SENIOR WARDEN'S ANNUAL REPORT - 2020

*"My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth."  
(Ps.121:2; NIV)*

God the Father, through Christ, has prevailed in sustaining us during 2020. The Church Year began as a glorious celebration with the dedication and consecration of The Chapel and initiation of the streaming of worship, teachings and events. Within days we were confronted with the reality of the coronavirus pandemic and its implications for gatherings. This challenge was met by most worship services and parish activities being suspended, restructured or streamed "on-line", to be faithful to public health restrictions. Anticipating the pandemic's impact on giving and pledges, the budget was reworked including reduction of clergy and staff salaries. Adding to the unexpected events of 2020 was the resignation from the clergy of Pastor Juan Rivera, though he and his family continue as parishioners.

There is no doubt about God's Providence. Parishioner participation in-person or on-line has significantly continued, donations have been generous, the reach of TCOTC has greatly broadened through streaming and the Food Bank families served have more than doubled. To present, the reduced staff salaries have been restored and all in-person worship services are available (though with COVID-19 limited participation). Furthermore, we successfully concluded "The Present for the Future" donation program in December.

Considering the impact of the continuing pandemic, the church budget has been developed for just the next six months. Any hope of resuming Parish normality lies beyond our population being extensively COVID-19 vaccinated.

Still, our future looks bright. We are searching for additional Parish clergy and, on the Diocesan level, a new bishop and perhaps we may see the conclusion of the Diocesan legal struggles with the Episcopal Church.

The Vestry( Jr. Warden Rod Musselman; Secretary Joanne Byrd; Treasurer Michael Simon; Sallie Brach; Doug Barone) thank God for: Fr. Owens' leadership along with our other Clergy; our Parish staff; our volunteers who have ministries in teaching, Hispanic outreach, Pastoral Care, Food Bank and God's Goods, music and more! We are blessed beyond measure.

In 2020, we currently have 9 nursery workers that help with our CrossPoint service each week. We are pleased to be caring for so many of the little children in the low country and sharing God's love with them.

On our Cross Schools Campus, we offer Nursery which includes ages infant to 3 years of age, and Cross Kids which is for our PK4-4<sup>th</sup> graders. We start each Sunday with upbeat praise and worship, move into our lesson, and finish with either a craft or game to reinforce the lesson. We want to offer the kids a safe and fun environment while teaching them about how to grow closer to Christ! Across 2020, we added Virtual Sunday School lessons. We reached many different states, even countries!

### **Special Events**

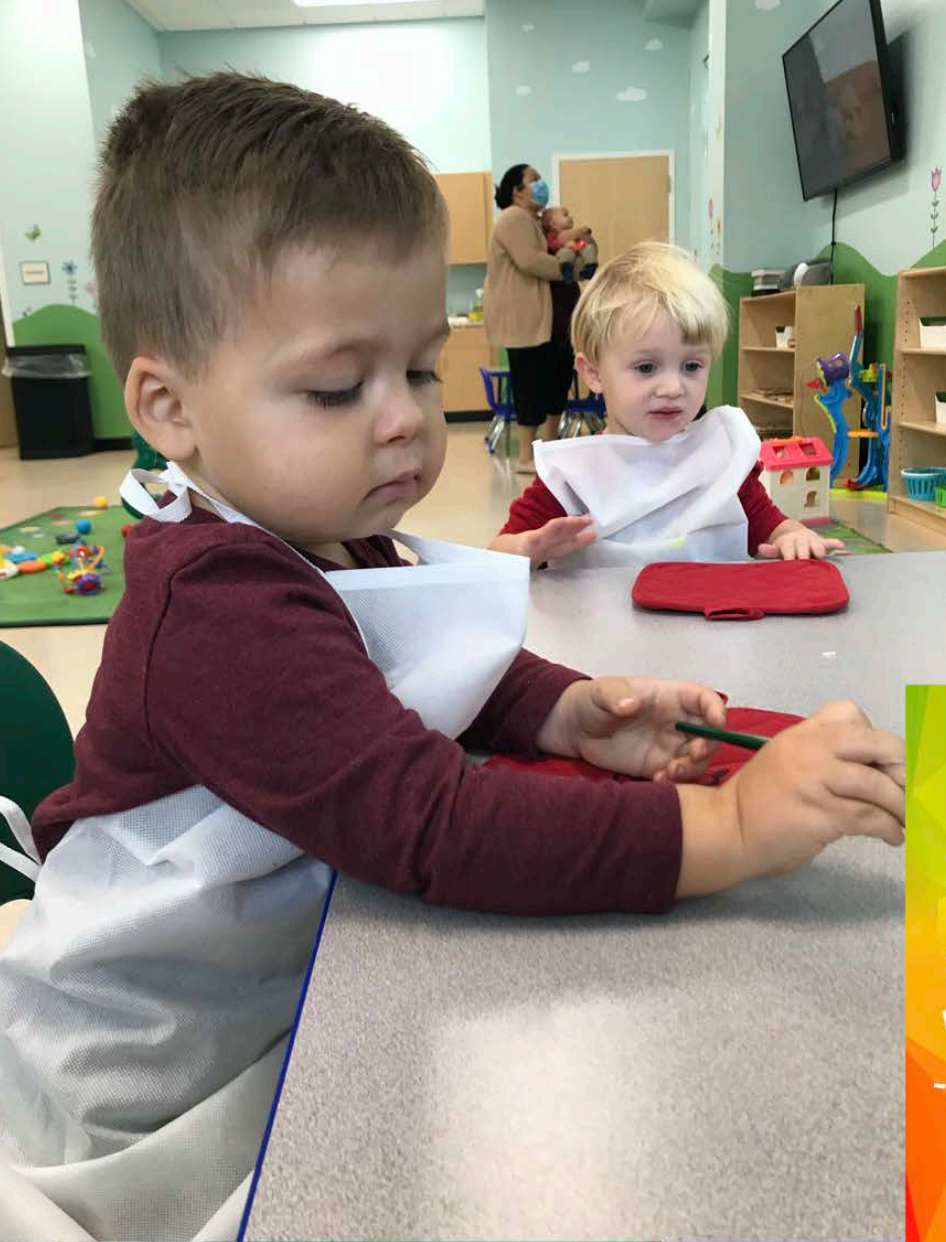

## CROSS SCHOOLS

*At Cross Schools, we inspire future leaders to grow spiritually and academically by intentionally designing opportunities for inquisitive learning and active service all for the glory of God.*

This year, Cross Schools made history in welcoming our first-ever 9<sup>th</sup> grade class! The 24 members of the class of 2024 brought the total enrollment of the school to over 600 students campus-wide. Even in the midst of the challenge accompanying the COVID-19 pandemic, our school community has joined together to make on-campus learning the reality for our student body, while making streaming instruction available to those students who are forced to miss class due to either preventative quarantine or recovery from a positive diagnosis of COVID-19. Our reputation of delivering a program of academic excellence has resulted in several recognitions and awards on both the local and state level. This past fall, Cross was recognized as the W. Keller Kissam School of Honor by the South Carolina Independent School Association this past fall. SCISA Executive Director Dr. Spencer Jordan remarked that "Cross Schools was being recognized for the school's cutting edge interactive academic programs as well as the school's commitment to STEM education initiatives."

Preventative measures implemented in the name of mitigating the spread of COVID-19 have often necessitated the re-thinking of how our students can find opportunities to serve their local and global communities. While we continued our partnership with Operation Christmas Child this year, and had a great level of participation by all measures, we also challenged our faculty to identify in class "micro-missions" that still taught the lessons and the blessings associated with service. One of our micro-missions of note saw lower school students writing personal letters to our members of the Armed Forces overseas. Our students were elated when they actually received correspondence back from several servicemen and women sharing how much their notes buoyed spirits when they were received.

At Cross Schools, we continue to provide opportunities for our students to know, love and grow in their understanding of Jesus Christ. Each school day begins in prayer and students and faculty routinely pray together in times of trial, and times of joy. A monthly prayer card authored for members of the Cross community challenge each of us to pray daily for a specific need or purpose of the school. Students continue participate in Faith Formation classes and weekly chapel services. Bible is incorporated into all aspects of daily life at Cross.

## CROSSPOINT WORSHIP

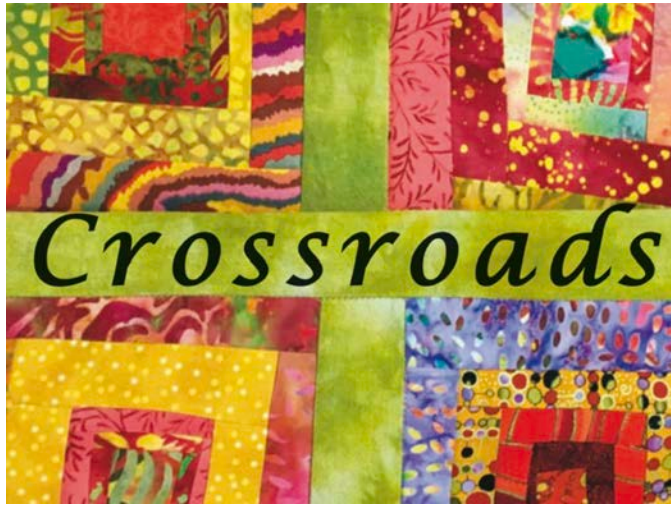

## CROSSROADS WOMEN'S SMALL GROUP BIBLE STUDY



The Crossroads Ministry for the year 2020 consisted of 8 groups meeting in the homes with a designated leader and up to 7 participants. We averaged 45-50 participants. Some groups chose to meet virtually due to Covid and some met in the homes maintaining social distancing. When it is safe to do so, all groups will return to the guidelines of meeting in the homes. We had 3 Sessions consisting of 8 or 9 weeks.

Session 1 Jan- March Study: Psalms

Session 2 Apr- May Study: Psalms

Session 3 Sept- Nov Book of Acts

We will continue to study Acts and complete it during the winter and spring session of 2021.

The Ministry Leaders Mimi Harmon, Carol Halpin and Sue Kelley met periodically during the year to discuss the progress of the groups and the direction that should be taken. Together, they prayerfully consider what Book of Scripture should be studied for the upcoming season. The recommendations are presented to the Crossroads Council for consideration and approval. The Crossroad Council met March 3 and May 31, 2020.

Every Group Leader has been encouraged by the women who share how much they have learned from the line by line Scripture reading and study. Women have developed real relationships with one another and feel safe and secure in sharing their lives and meeting each other's needs through prayer and fellowship.

Mimi Harmon will step down from Leadership in May. We are prayerfully seeking a replacement.

## THE DAUGHTERS OF THE HOLY CROSS - ESTHER CHAPTER

The Daughters of the Holy Cross are women who have committed our lives to the work and service of our Lord Jesus Christ. We pray daily for our Church, its clergy, other DHC sisters, and others in need. Under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and equipped with the powerful sword of truth as contained in the Holy Bible, we reach out to those who do not know Jesus to share His message of salvation through word and deed. We wear our cross as a symbol of Jesus' sacrifice and our need for Him to be Lord of our lives. In community with our sisters, we are strengthened and encouraged to keep our fourfold vow of Prayer, Service, Study and Evangelism.

January 4, 2020, fifteen ladies were admitted into the Esther Chapter. Our chapter now has twenty-two members. In June a dear sister, Sandy Reiter went on to be with the Lord. Sandy was an inspiration to all by her strong faith and love of God. She was one of the eight founding members of the Esther Chapter.

Candidates to the Order must allow a period of three months contemplation and nine weeks of study to become a member of the Esther Chapter. We hope to have another opportunity for women at The Church of the Cross to become Daughters in 2021.

Our support of each other in prayer, encouragement and action strengthens us daily, especially evident during this last trying year.

The Esther Chapter chose Spicy Grove Youth Center in Jamaica as our primary service project. In July we took an offering from each daughter's "Blessing Jar" and sent a check to Pastor Danny Myers for \$1400 to be used at his discretion for the ministry. (Each member of the Esther chapter maintains a "Blessing Jar". As she experiences God's blessings in her life she has an opportunity to bless others in His name by placing donations into her jar.)

The members of the Esther chapter also decided in October to buy books for the 120 children of Spicy Grove and ship them to Jamaica as our special Christmas gifts. The many books were purchased and wrapped and then shipped in a barrel with other supplies to Jamaica. Linda Laird, a member, applied for funding from MOMMS in the amount of \$4000.00 for iPads, food, Christian resources and the shipping expenses. MOMMS approved the application and The Church of the Cross also supported this

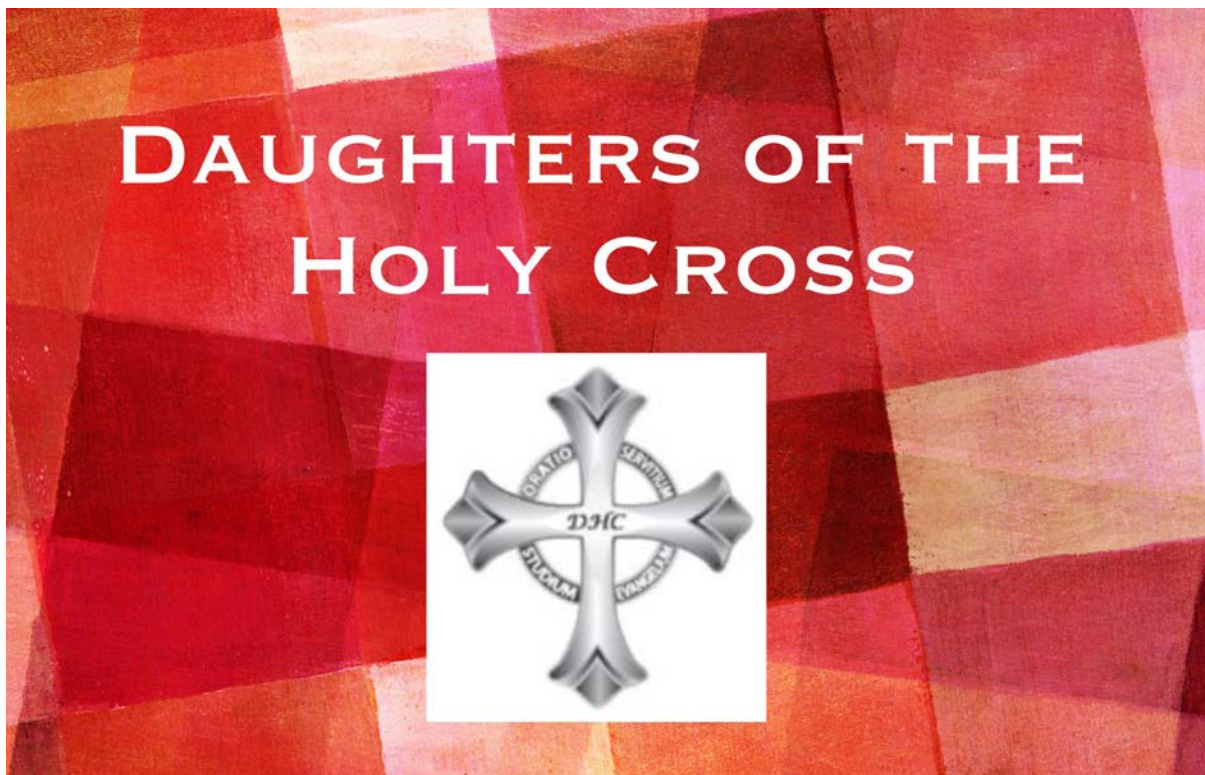
service project in Jamaica. The Esther Chapter will continue to support, pray for and help Spicy Grove guided by love and how the Lord leads.

Our ongoing Service Project is to create the Baptismal Banners for each child under twelve years of age. About five to six daughters gather to assemble the banners several times a year. The banners are presented to the family for the child at a church service.

Judy Kagle Ferguson, a member of our chapter, became a Mentor to The Church of the Redeemer in Orangeburg. Fourteen women of their parish sought membership in the Order and forming a Chapter at their church. Judy answered the call to be a resource to enable others to form Chapters at their own churches. Training sessions via Zoom began in February and ended at the end of April, with the 14 women beginning and 12 actually completing the training. The official Ruth Chapter's installation has been held up by the physical limits of the pandemic. We have remained close and pray for each other. God has blessed us to be a blessing.

### **Youth Group**

The groups include:

Middle School (5th - 8th grades) - Meets weekly from 6 - 8 p.m. on Wednesday nights

High School (9th - 12 grades) - Meets weekly on Tuesday nights from 6:00 - 8:00.

### **Sunday Morning Youth Bible Studies**

We have both a Middle and High School Bible study on Sunday Mornings at 10:30, and we meet upstairs at the Crosspoint campus. Both groups are studying the book of Acts. How relevant for our times, as we learn to live what we believe and to share our faith and hope in a world that's full of doubts and fears!

### **Confirmation Class**

Each year, we lead a Youth Confirmation session that meets on Sunday mornings at Crosspoint. We normally begin these classes in the Fall, and the Bishop confirms the students during a special service at the historic campus.

### **Bible Studies at Cross Schools**

We have weekly Bible studies for both girls and boys in various middle and high school grades during their lunch periods. This is one more way to connect with our teens and to disciple them as they grow in their faith.

### **New College and Career Ministry**

We're starting a Young Adult ministry for 18-25 year olds and are so excited about the opportunity. Our meetings will begin this February, and dates and times for gatherings are in the works.

# MISSIONS

## FOOD BANK

*The Food Bank ministry mission is to give spiritual and nutritional support for anyone in need. We seek to honor God by lightening the load of life for everyone we serve in His name.*

2020 has been both a year of change and a year of consistency. The Covid virus forced the food bank to completely change its operation. In 2019, food bank guests gathered inside, heard a sermon synopsis and selected their food. In 2020, guests did not come inside. They drove by to have food and other goodies delivered to their cars by a human chain of volunteers from 12:30 - 2:30 PM every Monday. Food Bank volunteers used Saturday and Monday mornings to gather food from Second Helpings, Low Country Food Bank, Cross Schools and from individual donations. This food is then put into bags for grocery, produce, meat and bread and each family is given 4 - 5 bags of food in their car as they drive by our "pick up" point.

The hardship caused by Covid was and is devastating. The number of guests served each week in 2020 tripled from 2019. The Food Bank served on average 135 families each week with some weeks providing food for more than 200 families. This community service was made possible by monetary donations from the congregation that were ten times higher than 2019. In addition, food donations from the congregation and other communities far exceeded 2019. The weekly average number of food bags donated in 2020 was 283.

Despite the changes in every operational aspect of the Food Bank ministry, volunteers kept the Food Bank delivering food and spiritual support every week (except one) all year. The Food Bank ministry has been blessed with a volunteer team that enjoys working together and serving our guests. Covid brought forth new dedicated volunteer faces to this ministry which we are grateful for, we are looking forward to the time when all of our volunteers are able to return and serve alongside us. The congregation and volunteers have kept the Food Bank ministry a constant light in a dark time. Thanks Be to God.

## GOD'S GOODS

God's Goods started out as a year we had anticipated celebrating a huge milestone. We were excitingly planning a summer event for our volunteers and church family...celebrating God's Goods 10-year anniversary.

(God's Goods opened on July 31, 2010.)

With the arrival of COVID-19 those plans were put on hold and the ministry closed normal operations on March 14<sup>th</sup> out of precaution for our volunteers and our community.

During the spring and summer months, our senior leaders worked extremely hard on the following:

- Developing and implementing preventative COVID health and safety measures and safeguards.
- Developing contingency plans and navigating through financial and operational challenges.
- Responding quickly to the ever changing COVID environment with an emphasis on communication with our volunteers, customers and church with social media and teleconferencing (with emphasis on staying connected).
- New plans were developed for storage of donations and management of all that was coming into the store (so needed as we had to shorten the store selling time due to COVID restrictions and less volunteers).

In summary we reconfigured the entire way the store operated and the protocol necessary to keep volunteers, donors and customers safe.

While the store was closed, so much outreach was accomplished! A new Outreach Coordinator helped oversee these efforts. Hampton County tornado victims were a huge part of the outreach in addition to Family Promise, Fr. Juan's outreach, Prison Ministry and Mercy Mission. The entire listing of goods that were gifted is attached in the "Pass Through" document.

God's Goods reopened on August 25, 2020 with a totally new way of doing ministry. Prior to COVID-19, God's Goods was open with 10 shifts per week and over 300 volunteers serving. In August we re-opened with just 3 shifts (working up to 5 shifts) a week with about 120 volunteers serving. In total volunteers served 20,692.50 hours in 2020.

God was JUST AMAZING during this VERY challenging year! After being closed for over 5 months \$319,343.00 was given to the mission field!! (See the MOMMS Annual Report for beneficiaries).

At the end of 2020, we were blessed to launch "God's Gifts" in partnership with the Food Bank ministry. Clothing and household items are gifted to guests of the Food Bank (and others in need) on Thursday afternoons.

God's Goods ministry is beyond grateful to God for our incredibly dedicated volunteers, customers and donors in addition to our church family and all those that support the work being done in and through this ministry reaching others in the mission field!

## MILITARY CARE MINISTRY

Our traditional activities which include donation of money to the Hampton Hall Wounded Warrior Golf Tournament, was first postponed, then canceled. Additionally, the MCM traditionally hosts the coffee hour at the Historic Campus after the 10AM service on both Memorial Day and Veteran's Day. Since there were no services at that location at that time, we did not host any coffee hours.

We did meet in person in October and November at the Parish Hall practicing social distancing & wearing masks. We made that decision because church services had resumed in person with strict participation requirements. However, as virus infections began rising in the Bluffton area, we changed to virtual meetings in January and will continue in that mode until things improve.

On the positive side, we continued to support our men & women in uniform. At Christmas time, we hosted a meal for patients at the Charleston Veteran's Hospital. We received a nice thank you from the hospital coordinators. Additionally, we have continued our relationship with Marjie Gaynor of the Adopt a Soldier Program on Hilton Head Island, as well as working with Jo-Ann Pimentel in Florida for a similar program. We provide financial support for postage to mail needed items to the troops, and collected food and clothing to be sent overseas. Roberta Rice and Al and Diane North have been points of contact between the MCM & our sister organizations.

We had a very successful collection of needed items from Cross Schools, which were forwarded to the troops. The total number of items brought in by the students were extraordinary! We can't thank the school coordinators enough for their involvement. The troops request food items such as tuna fish and chicken in packets rather than cans. They also request snack items and in some cases socks, blankets and gloves. Cross School came through on all counts.

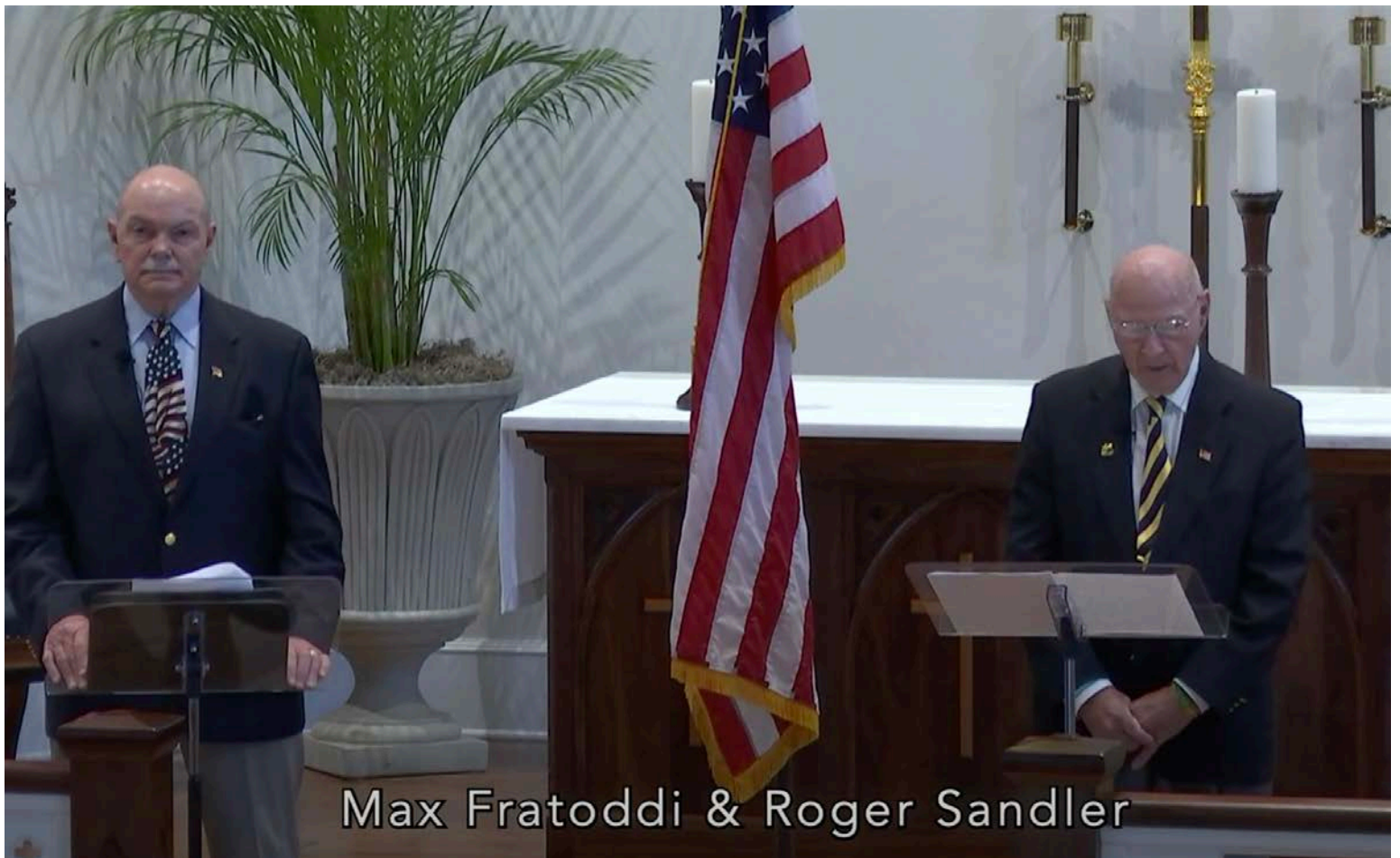

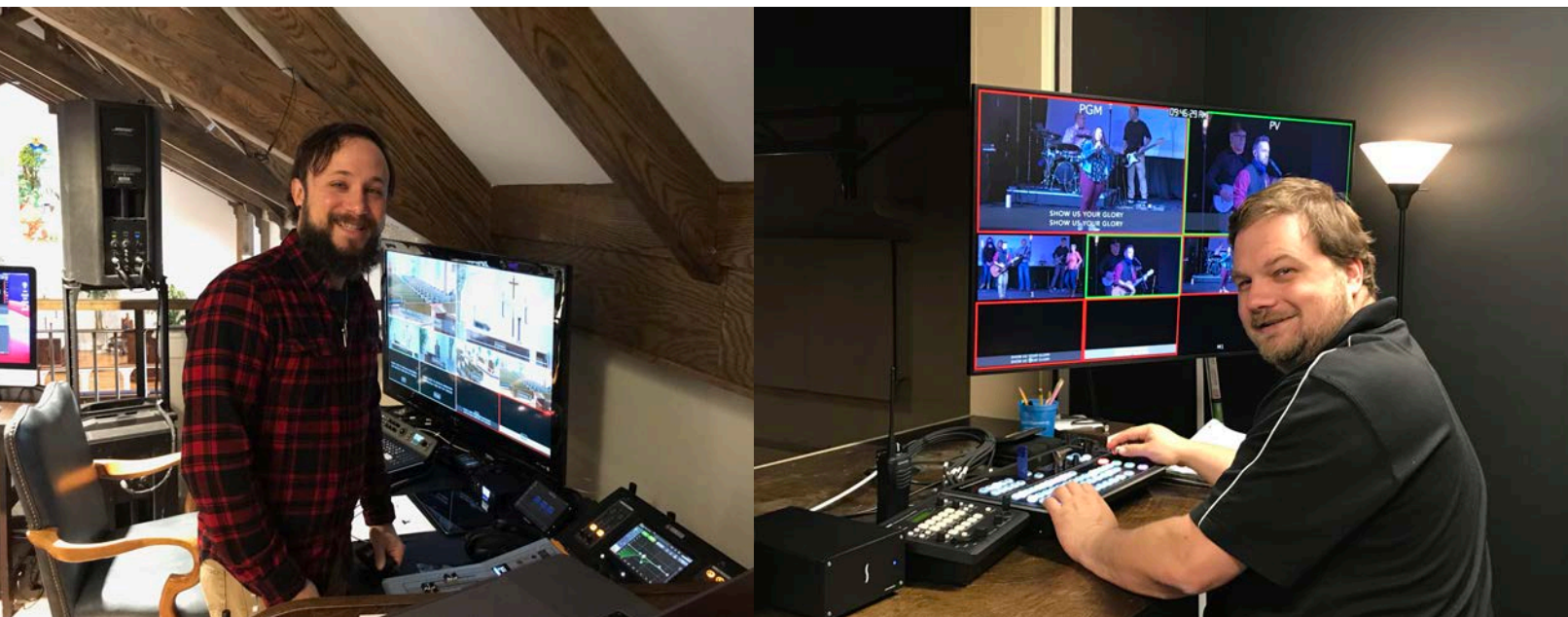

## ARTS PRODUCTION (TECHNOLOGY) MINISTRY

Over the course of 2020, the tech/production team at The Church of the Cross has had a significant outreach, especially with the temporary closing of physical services due to the shelter in place mandate from mid-March to the end of May. The most significant additions to the technology ministry were through the construction completion of The Chapel on the Buckwalter campus in February, which integrated live streaming, and also the addition of live streaming to the CrossPoint worship service. The first stream launched with The Chapel's dedication service on February 24. Then, three weeks later, streaming became the sole platform for opportunities to engage in worship as a church due to restrictions from the coronavirus pandemic. Streaming has continued even after the re-opening of physical services for those who are not able to attend physically and we plan to continue to offer the online experience moving forward in 2021. We have seen people from all over our country and even other countries tune in to our website stream feed, Facebook and YouTube. Throughout 2020, we streamed the Sunday 9am Chapel services and 10:30am CrossPoint services, Tuesday Padre's Pondering updates, Wednesday Night Teaching series, Wednesday Night Healing services, Good Friday Stations of the Cross service, Epiphany service, Easter service from the Chapel, all Christmas services from The Chapel and CrossPoint, and also a number of devotionals and content that were made available throughout the weeks.

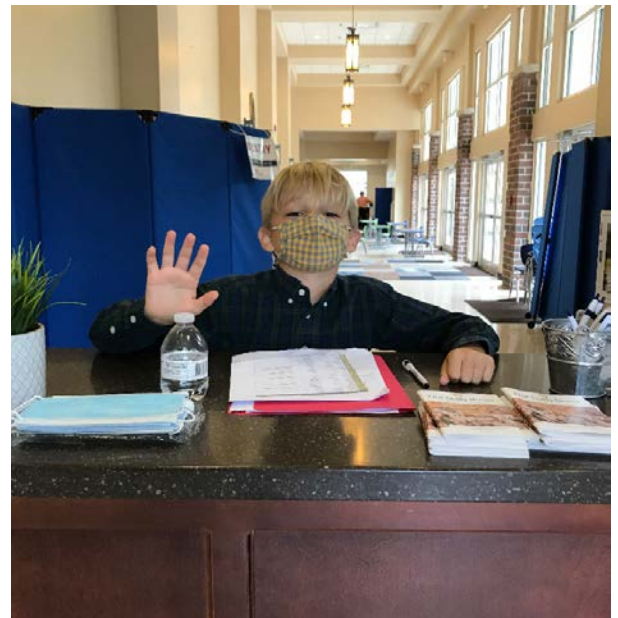
